


A flying start!

James Pratt produces pedigree Holstein cattle at Studdah Farm, Leyburn and likes to get his calves off to a flying start. James began using Jameson IMMU-Surge calf milk replacer (CMR) at the start of this year and has been delighted with the results. James has a meticulous regime for his calves and his approach has paid dividends. Calves are given 4 litres of colostrum via a stomach tube within the first 6 hours after birth. Then four feeds of 2 litres of mother's milk is fed before calves go onto calf milk replacer. Calves start on 500g of CMR and build up to 1000g. James uses a weigh band to assess performance

and he finds calves double their weight by eight weeks of age. Calves are housed individually at first and then go into groups of five. Calves are weaned slowly over a long period of time and they are not moved during this time to avoid stress. James has found that calves are gaining more weight on our calf milk and he has no scour problems. James started using IMMU-Surge in January so it will be interesting to see heifer reared on this regime come into the herd – what a great start they've had!

According to EBLEX, supplies of beef are forecast to fall in 2015 resulting in brighter prospects for the beef industry. In 2015 supplies are set to fall 2% in the UK and the picture is similar globally, in fact, the USA and Russia could see falls of 6% and 1.5%. Big global traders like Australian and New Zealand are predicted to see drops in production of 4% and 9% respectively. However, if prospects do improve for beef in 2015, producers still need to keep a focus on efficiency. At the very least beef finishers should know the live weight of cattle coming onto the holding and the live weights of animals leaving. Using time on farm, daily live weight gain for each animal can be calculated. This coupled with slaughter classification for conformation and fatness can be used to improve production and feed conversion efficiency. The new greening rules are to be applied on a whole farm basis and part of the greening rules now includes Ecological Focus Areas (EFA'S). So what does this mean and what's in and what's not? Rated highly in your claim are hedges. Buffer Strips, Catch and Cover Crops, Nitrogen Fixing Crops and Fallow are all included and are now applied on a whole farm basis. Importantly, the initial concern with regard to late payment if hedges were included will not now be subject to delays.

So farms with less than 30ha of arable land and more than 75% of the holding in grass are exempt from compliance. Also, exempt are any holdings with less than 15ha of purely arable land.


The collapse in the milk price over the last 6 months from 34p to 26p can only be described as catastrophic. Following on from a winter when the returns for dairy production were reasonable for the first time in many years this drop, which equates to £80,000 per million litres produced will push dairy farmers into the red. Concentrate price falls will save around 1p per litre and fuel price drops may save another 0.5p but that is their limit.

Personally, I can remember the situation in the late 90's when the milk price dropped to 16p from 25p. Savings had to be made but care had to be taken that they did not make the situation worse by cutting output. Decisions were difficult and knowing what was the best way forward through the problems wasn't easy. Having the right information is critical to making the right decisions.
