If any bulls go over 14 months they are sold fat through Gisburn auction. Currently, weights of between 440 and 470kg are achieved, at a killing out percent of 53 and O2 or O3 grade. Cattle go on to a finishing diet of Jameson premium beef nuts and rolled barley with ad lib straw at 3-4 months of age.

Finishing black & white bulls can provide farmers with a quick turnaround; however cattle need to be pushed all the way through the system.

Grass check part 2

If your grass fields are not performing as you well as you would like then soil compaction should be considered as a possible cause. Soil compaction is a well-covered topic now, however it is still often overlooked by many of us, and can still be responsible for a lot of reduced performance seen in grass leys. 80% of compaction occurs the first time you drive a tractor across the field, so trying to stick to the same wheel marks can be of benefit.

As mentioned in previous newsletters, the best and cheapest way to assess compaction is to dig a 12 inch square hole by a foot deep, when the soil is moist but not wet. Try to remove this in one piece and lay it next to your hole. Or cut 3 sides of the hole with the spade and lever the clod out, keeping one side of your pit untouched by the spade. You can then examine the "natural" face of the pit, for tight patches, indicating a compact layer. Ideally the top 2 inches of the clod, should have a nice crumbly structure, the next 2 inches

should be half crumbly, and below this the remaining soil should have around 10% crumb texture. In an ideal world grass roots should be down to 30cm depth.

Once you have established if compaction is an issue. and how deep the problem is, then you can think about how to combat it. Pasture spiking or subsoiling, are not cheap operations in diesel, time and wear. You need to be sure that they are right for the job. Furthermore, once the compaction is alleviated will the grass that is there "pay you back". If the grass has been down for more than 7 years a total reseed is definitely an option. The cost of a ploughed reseed is around £150/acre. Ploughing will also rectify compaction, as well as aerate the soil. Pento-Guard for wholecrop silage David Lewis

With the drop in cereal price there has been renewed interest in wholecrop silage for feeding to dairy cattle. Wholecrop silage is a good complement to leafy grass silage enabling the cow to extract the maximum nutrients from the combined diet. Young grass silage alone tends to be digested too quickly, going straight through the cow. The extra fibre from wholecrop provides roughage for the rumen bugs and the higher starch level provides more energy in to the diet. Wholecrop silage, at an average of 45% dry matter is also less acidic than wetter grass silage and can reduce the acid loading. In dry cow rations the lower potassium level found in wholecrop reduces the incidence of milk fever.

The problem with this high dry matter, high fibre silage is that it is prone to warming up in the clamp. The straw fraction of the silage is hollow and this gives a big surface area for the bugs to work on, especially when the air temperature is high.

Using Pento-guard silage additive, wholecrop temperature can be controlled.

Our Pento-quard has four components:

- 1. Xylanase enzyme which digests the xylose fibres to produce pentose sugars yet maintaining the structural levels in the silage.
- 2. Enterococcus faecium to prevent the development of pathogens.
- 3. Lactobacillus Buchneri feeds on the pentose sugars to produce both acetic and lactic acids. This balance of acids is better suited to the cow than lactic alone and the acetic component also inhibits the formation of yeasts and moulds.

Stubble turnips can produce an excellent, cost effective feed for finishing lambs which is available in just 12 weeks. As a guide, a good summer sown crop should yield about 40t fresh per hectare and feed 50 lambs for 60-70 days. Stubble turnips can be sown from late July to the end of August following cereals if desired. Unlike cattle, sheep do not need a roughage when feeding brassicas, however they will need a run-back area. Feed costs for grazing lambs on stubble turnips compare favourably with grass finishing systems but will be considerably cheaper than concentrate finishing.

Target live weight gain of 0.7-0.8 kg can be achieved with heifers outwintered on a stubble turnip based diet and good quality haylage. However, mineral buckets need to be offered. Also, utilization can be fairly low at 35-45%, although the roots can be later grazed with sheep.

Creep feeding lambs can be beneficial and economical provided the increased gain exceeds the costs of feed, labour and feeding equipment. The feed conversion efficiency will vary from 4:1 before weaning deteriorating to 12:1 as the lambs get older. The additional live weight gain from creep feeding can vary from 20-100g per day. Daily live weight gain should be enhanced by 50-70g to deliver an additional 4-5 kg of live weight over a 9-12 week creep feeding period.

Higher growth rates are found in lambs creep fed when stocking rates are tight and sward heights below 4cm.
